I know that at this time of year it is a particularly anxious period for parents of our Year 6 children. The responsibility for choosing the "right school" can weigh heavily on us. With this in mind, I wanted to share the positive experience we have had so far, having chosen St. John Fisher as my son's high school.

I have visited the school on several occasions and spoken to the staff personally and I can't praise them enough for their support and help settling in the new Year 7 children. The school has invested in online support systems such as SIMS and FROG, which allow parents direct interface with the school and the ability to monitor behaviour, attendance and homework amongst other things. You can even check exactly what your child has for their lunch each day! They work hard to ensure the Year 7 children have as seamless a transition as possible and are on hand to help when you need it.

The children are supported by a very committed staff and together their work is paying off. St John Fisher are celebrating an 18% improvement in their GCSEs results this year, which takes them above the national average. The Year 11 students worked incredibly hard and the school is justifiably proud of this achievement. Work now continues into this year and a parental information evening has already been held to ensure families understand what is ahead.

In other year groups the school has seen a great start to the academic year and new CARE values - Commitment, Aspiration, Respect, Excellence - are underpinning all aspects of school life for both students and staff.

St John Fisher has worked hard through difficult circumstances to ensure the standards are being raised and that they become the best school they can be.

Having benefited from a great start to your children's academic journey in our school, I hope that you will take advantage of continuing their Catholic education and bless the high school with your children. It is a great way to support our whole Catholic family by ensuring our high school succeeds in their endeavours to provide the best education and support for our young students on their onward journey in to adulthood whilst upholding the values of our faith.

Did you know?

When a school is reviewed by OfSTED they look at attendance and if a school has low attendance this can effect their grading!

To be at least good we have to be over 96%. Last year we were 96.3%.

Regular attendance at school is vital to help your child achieve and get the best possible start in life. Even missing one day could mean that they are missing out on an important learning point that might benefit them in the future. School is aware however, that from time to time we can fall ill and that is taken into account in our above system!

What does this look like in days?

There are 30 days in a 6 week term – if your child has 1 ½ days off, their attendance will be 95%. The Government have set high targets for schools to achieve. How will you help your school and your child?

Holidays

As you can see above, if you take a term time holiday it can have a huge impact on your child's education. Children only attend school 190 days a year out of the 365 days! There are some great deals to be had during school holidays which can be just as good as the ones you can get during school time. School follows Kirklees policy when it comes to requests for leave of absence, and there are very few cases where it can be authorised. Term time leave of absences can result in penalty notices being issued. Please be aware that school does not get this money, Kirklees does. However, term time holidays do negatively impact our school attendance which could impact our "Good School" status!

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Our School Development

Last year, we decided to focus on the following areas:

- Improving overall outcomes at all key stages
- Improve attendance, working towards that 97%
- Develop a love of learning across the school
- Develop EYFS provision areas
- Continue to develop the English curriculum
- To support new to role senior and middle leaders.



I am pleased to report we have made great strides into achieving in many areas and making a positive impact in others. EYFS outcomes were improved last year and they received a glowing review for the work they are doing from visitors to the school. Attendance improved from 96.1% to 96.3%, hopefully we can continue this upward trend. Children could tell me all about the exciting things they had been learning, and staff reported increased enthusiasm for many areas including maths and writing! The English curriculum is now book led and the children are enjoying reading a range of texts. New to role senior and middle leaders have made good impact on standards across the school and have received excellent CPD throughout the year. The one area we have not made as much progress in is improving outcomes at all key stages and this will be a strong focus for this academic year.

This year, OFSTED have released a new framework for inspections, we will be doing a lot of work in school to ensure that we remain good and that we are beginning our journey to outstanding under this new framework. It is our long term vision (5 - 15 years) to create a school where all children leave with the skills and knowledge they need to succeed in life, where they are happy to come to school and show a love of learning and where all staff are highly skilled in creating the right learning opportunities that will benefit our pupils and our community. This year we are starting our journey towards achieving that vision and will be focusing on the following areas:

We will be implementing character education and virtues to live by.

These are key skills that every person needs in life to flourish and work for the community and not against it. The children will learn about things like thankfulness, respect and courtesy, patience, perseverance, determination, have a go, to not be afraid to FAIL (first attempt in learning), concentrate, compromise and about win-win situations etc. It is a really exciting time, and these are key character traits that will benefit them for years to come. You can help us by talking to your children about their learning muscles at home, and reinforcing that it is important to have a go even when you think you can't do it.

We will be having a real focus on improving outcomes for pupils.

This will be our second year of focusing on this area, and some of the things we put in place may not have the impact this year but will benefit the children in years to come. We are having a specific focus on reading in particular. We have revamped the library and the way home readers works already. The staff are receiving CPD in new innovative ways to develop comprehension this year. Please support school in it's goal by reading with your children regularly at home – this is both their home reader and reading for fun. A child who reads – succeeds!

We will be revamping our foundation subject curriculum.

We agree with the sentiments coming from OFSTED and the department of education that children should know if they are learning about History, or Geography or DT. At the moment, the school teaches topic which incorporates all the subjects but that doesn't help a child know that they might have a particular love of a specific subject. It is an exciting time to revamp such a big part of our curriculum. You can help us by asking your child what they have been learning about in history etc so they get used to the new language we are using.

• We will be working on strategies that show that all adults have high expectations of what the children can achieve.

This area might include things like presentation, for instance pen licences, or it might include reducing worksheets so the children can show more of their thoughts etc. We are also having a big look at how we can challenge all learners. Research shows that children of any ability relish a challenge and prefer "harder" work. So this year, we are beginning that process of how we can live out our vision for a high challenge, but low threat learning opportunity in every lesson. We are at the beginning of this journey. You can help us by encouraging your child to try new things and helping them build their confidence in tackling things they may perceive as scary or too difficult.

The last are we are focusing on is engaging with the Bishop's vision for all Catholic Schools to join an Academy Trust.

A huge thank you to all parents who have sent their questions in or attended any meetings. I will continue to keep you informed as the process moves forward. As Head, I am fully involved with the other Heads (of the 16 schools in total) in making decisions about what is best for our children going forward. If you do have any questions, please do put them in writing and hand them into the office. The Governors will address any questions you may have as soon as the answers become available to us.

Thank you for taking the time to read this section of our newsletter. There are a number of things across school that we really need some help on. We thank you in advance for supporting us on these items.

Budget Cuts

You may have heard in the news that many schools are facing budget cuts this year, unfortunately, we are one of those schools. This has made it very difficult for the school to run effectively and access the resources it needs. The Governors and staff of St Paulinus are working very hard to make cuts where we can without impacting the children's education but the shortfall of over £100,000 is making this very difficult.

Next week, the school will start some essential works to the boiler house. In order for us to keep our children and staff safe and warm, we need to replace our boilers and remove some asbestos from the boiler house. These works are costing nearly £176,000. We have managed to get funding for the majority of the works but as a voluntary aided school we are required to pay 10% of the costs.

To pay for these essential works we need to raise a further £17,200. The school's recreational fund is usually used to pay for the 10% but we only have £912 in it at the moment. If you could find it in your hearts to contribute to this fund we ask for £19.50 per child or £39 per family (where there is more than one child who attends the school) per year. If the majority of our parents contributed we could raise £11,700 which would mean that we do not have to use money that is earmarked to pay for things the children need for their learning or to make their learning fun.

If you are willing to support school and your child's education please log on to parent pay to make your contribution to the recreational fund. If you need any help, the office will be available for support. Following these works there will be a further £115,132 worth of works to complete the project (this includes the last part of our roof to be done and the completion of the heating project). School's contribution to this will be £11,513.20. As you can see, these are large amounts so anything you can contribute to the recreational fund will be gratefully received.

Educational Visits

St. Paulinus Catholic
Primary School is committed to the
continuous raising of achievement of
all our pupils. We strive to arrange a
variety of trips that will enrich the
curriculum and enhance your child's
learning experiences.

We rely on parental support to cover the costs and, without sufficient contributions, these trips could potentially have to be cancelled. To ensure trips go ahead as planned we ask for a contribution on ParentPay a minimum of two weeks before the visit takes place.

Each year group has the opportunity to go on **one trip** this year so please make your contribution on time.

Any costs for a trip cover entrance fees, transportation costs and any workshop charges if applicable. St. Paulinus covers the staffing costs and the ParentPay transaction fee of 1.75%.

We ask parents / carers who use this area **not to park here** on a morning. If you need to take your child into school, we ask that you find safe alternate parking.

Uniform Shop!

We wear a uniform to show that we are all part of one team and that we are all equal. Our uniform helps us prepare for the world of work where in many professions there is a dress code you must follow. Thank you to all the parents who donate their old uniforms to school for our Uniform shop. Uniform can be purchased from Rawcliffes in Dewsbury or from Miss Ellis in school.

Our uniform is:

Boys: grey trousers or shorts, pale blue polo shirt with the logo or shirt, school jumper with the logo, all black school shoes, white or grey socks

Girls: As above, but girls can also choose from a grey skirt or blue and white checked dress in the summer, or a grey cardigan with the school logo. Girls must wear sensible, flat, all black shoes (no heels or boots).

PE: Blue or black shorts, white t-shirt, trainers or pumps. If your child is doing outdoor PE in the winter months they can also choose to wear grey, blue or black jogging bottoms for warmth and a grey, blue or black jumper/ hoody to keep them warm outside.

Hair: no lines/ shaved heads, long hair should be tied up for safety reasons and no hair dyes. Our children can save that for when they are older or for the summer holidays.

Jewellery: please ensure that if your child does wear earrings they are a simple stud and these must be removed for PE days for your child's safety. Taking part in PE is a statutory requirement. No other jewellery is needed for school
