

### Autumn Term Curriculum Letter

This term we are looking forward to lots of new and exciting things again.

### Our topics this term are 'The Tudors' & 'The UK'.

(See topic plan for full details)

During the first half term, in <u>History</u>, we will discover how the Tudors came to rule and explore Henry VIII's lifestyle as a significant figure. We will learn how the Church of England was formed and compare how school life changed for pupils during the Tudor period.

During the second half term, in **Geography**, we will look at where the UK is located, naming some of the counties and cities in the UK and locating key features such as hills and rivers. We will also look at how the UK has changed over time and compare a region in the UK to a region in Europe, explaining the geographical similarities and differences.

In <u>R.E.</u> the topics are 'The Bible' and 'Trust in God'. Through these topics we will be looking at and exploring the different parts of the Bible. We will look at different parables and discuss how they affect people's beliefs. We will explore the meaning of trust and discuss why at times people may find it hard to trust God. Parents are encouraged to start discussions with children relating to these topics focusing on key terminology and its meaning.

In <u>Mathematics</u> we will recap and add to our knowledge of place value, looking at four-digit numbers and rounding to the nearest 10, 100 or 1000. We will then add and subtract four-digit numbers, exploring different methods and deciding what operations to use when solving problems. The focus will then turn to multiplication and division where we will solve further problems and learn new methods including the distributive law. We will build up to using our knowledge to multiply and divide mentally. We will then interpret and present data using bar charts, pictograms and time graphs. To help your child you need to provide them with opportunities to practise their times tables, as they will be taking part in a mandatory times table test at the end of the year. Please also recap on using the four basic operations, and encourage problem solving relating to real life issues, with money and measure for example. We would also ask you to encourage your children to tell the time, using both analogue and digital clocks.

In <u>English</u> we will be using the novels 'Varjak Paw' and 'Children of Winter' to drive our learning. We will practise writing in a range of genres including narratives and non-chronological reports. We will also have a weekly grammar / punctuation focus as well as our weekly spelling tests. As parents / carers you can support at home by helping your child to complete homework relating to our class work and pointing out descriptive writing, encouraging discussions around why it is a good piece of writing.

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In <u>Science</u> we will begin by learning about 'Animals Including Humans'. We will consider why our teeth are different shapes and understand that they have different functions. We will use evidence from our knowledge of an animal's diet to identify which teeth belong to which animal; exploring carnivores, herbivores and omnivores. We will learn the basic parts of the digestive system and begin to understand their functions. We will then explore what electricity is and how it is used in our daily lives. We will study where electricity comes from and how it travels. There will be plenty of investigations in this unit of work as we will be exploring how we can change the flow of electricity and what happens when we change different components in a circuit.

In <u>RPSHE</u> we will explore self-esteem and self-worth through recognising our personal qualities and individuality, identifying positive things about ourselves, and recognising our achievements. We will look at setting goals for ourselves and how we can achieve these and also how we can manage when there are set-backs and learn from our mistakes. We will then explore how we can treat each other with respect and the link between rights and responsibilities. Our Pol-Ed learning will help us explore feelings, the intensity of these, coping with them and how they can vary. We will look at the features of healthy family life and link this to our learning on respect.

<u>Physical Education (P.E.)</u> - under the new guidelines, <u>children must come to school in their P.E.</u> <u>kits</u> ready for lessons.

- The St. Paulinus P.E. kit consists of:
  - o a plain white t-shirt with or without the school logo (no brands or patterns),
  - o plain black or dark grey shorts / jogging bottoms or leggings (no brands or patterns),
  - o grey school hoodie with the school logo,
  - Trainers or a pair of pumps.
- In addition, the <u>only</u> jewellery permitted in school is a pair of plain small stud earrings. If your child has pierced ears, these need to be removed on each morning of P.E. for health and safety reasons.

Please note that staff are not able to remove earrings, so this will result in your child not taking part in our P.E. lesson and an alternative task will be provided for the child, this is due to health and safety reasons.

- Long hair must be tied back.
- Please ensure your child wears their PE kit on their PE days. All P.E. kit and School uniform must be labelled clearly with your child's name. If it becomes lost, it can then be easily returned to the rightful owner.

<u>Homework</u> - This will be handed out on a Friday and **MUST** be completed and returned to school by the Wednesday.

**Reading** - Children will have an independent reading book which will be brought home on a daily basis and MUST be returned to school every day. Your child will read as much as possible in school to an adult on a weekly basis. Children can be reading their own independent book from home or class reading area once they have finished their given book. Children's independent reading books are changed once a week in school. Please remember to write in your child's reading record to acknowledge that you have listened to your child read. It is also very important to check your child's understanding when reading, so please ask them questions about what they have read.

<u>Timetables and Spellings</u> - The children will have a list of ten spellings which will be tested on a Friday. Timestables are very important in Year 4 and should be practised as often as possible. The children can access TimesTable Rockstars (using their individual log in) to support them with these. Timestables will also be practised and tested in school during the week.

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## English – As writers and communicators we will:

- Base our writing around 'Varjak Paw' and 'Children of Winter.'
- Write for a range of purposes and audiences.
- Write in the role of a character, inferring their thoughts and feelings using evidence from the text.
- Write a setting description using what we have learnt in the book.
- Be able to answer comprehension questions about the books.
- Gather facts and information and use these to create a non-chronological report.
- Empathise with the different characters we come across.
- Recap on the fundamental skills of writing such as punctuation, capital letters and word classes.

## Geography - As geographers we will:

- Learn where the UK is located in the
- Be able to name some of the countries and cities in the UK.
- Locate key features in the UK such as hills and rivers.
  - Explore and research how the UK has developed over time.
- Be able to use maps, recognising map symbols.

### French - As linguists we will:

- Count from 1 to 40 and complete simple calculations.
- Say the months of the year and when our birthdays are.
- Discuss our families, what they look like and how they act.

# Year 4: The Tudors & The UK Autumn Term Curriculum Overview

Art - As artists we we will

- Describe Henry VIII's lifestyle by focusing on the work of Henry Matisse and Francis
- Explore how African prints are made and design our own.
- Explore the method of collage and create our own using inspiration from different

### Computing – We will

- Consider our online profile and how to keep safe online.
- Consider the effects of plagiarism.
- Identify the positive and negative influences of technology on health.
- Learn how to search effectively.

### Music - We will

- Demonstrate an understanding a appropriate use of musical language.
- Identify and describe feelings as they relate to music.
- Demonstrate an understanding of the musical style and a broader understanding of the cultural and historical connections of the music.

### PE - As athletes we will :

- Learn the key components of gymnastics.
- Create and preform our own gymnastic routines.
- Learn the rules and skills needed for tag rugby.

## Design Technology – As designers we will:

- Evaluate existing products for their audience and purpose.
- Create a range of different switches.
- Learn how to create simple circuits and be able to find faults in them.
- Create our own plan for a product with an intended purpose and audience.
- Create our own illuminated sign.

## History - As historians we will:

- Explain how the Tudors came to rule.
  - Describe Henry VIII's lifestyle.
- Explore how the Church of England was formed.
- Compare how school life changed for pupils during the Tudor period.

### Science - As scientists we will:

- Identify that animals need the correct nutrition. We will describe the way food and water move within animals.
- We will describe simple functions of our digestive system.
- We will identify different types of teeth and learn their functions.
- Use and produce food chains to show the flow of energy.
- Learn about different components in an electrical circuit and explore how to safely put am electric circuit together.
- Work scientifically to set up simple practical enquiries, comparative and fair tests.

# Mathematics – As mathematicians we will:

- Revise our basic skills and place value; focusing on 4-digit numbers. Problem solving will be ongoing.
- Revise all four operations and be able to add and subtract 4-digit numbers.
- Revise all four operations and solve problems involving measure (e.g. length, mass, volume, money) using decimal notation including scaling.
- Revise our times tables; this will be a focus throughout the year.
- Interpret and present data.

### R.E. - As theologians we will

- Focus on the Biblical figures Abraham,
  Moses, David, Joseph and Jonah.
- Explore the importance of the Bible, how it is divided into Testaments and the different types of writing it contains.
- Discuss how the meanings of different Bible stories can form beliefs for Christians.
- Explore what trust is and what it means to us.
- Look at how we can trust in God and why this can sometimes be a hard thing to do, making links to Mary and Joseph and the Christmas story.
