Year 6 - Spring Term Curriculum Letter

Now that the New Year is well underway and your children are enjoying lots of exciting learning, here is all the information for the Spring Term.

In <u>Religious Education (R.E.)</u> we will be studying the topics 'Exploring the Mass' and 'Jesus the Messiah'. There will be further opportunities to contribute to Act of Worship sessions and fully immerse themselves in the spirituality of the school.

At home, encourage discussions with children relating to these topics focusing on key terminology and its meaning.

In <u>Mathematics</u> we will use our knowledge and understanding of number & place value and the four operations $(+, -, X \text{ and } \div)$ as a foundation to build on when applying these skills to problem-solving and reasoning situations. (Further information can be found on the topic plan). We will also look at fractions, decimals, percentages, converting units of measure, ratio and geometry in preparation for the end of year SAT assessments.

At home, please encourage regular maths games involving dice, mental calculation of numbers and money, practical use of maths in shopping making it relevant to the real world wherever possible and finally to continue to practice and learn their **times tables** making use of the games on the 'TT **Rockstar**' website.

In <u>English</u> writing, we will complete our work on the Elizabeth Laird's novel, 'Oranges in No Man's Land' firstly looking at Journalistic Writing then focus on the features of a Recount. After that, we will turn our attention to another award-winning text, Shaun Tan's picture book 'The Arrival'. It examines what drives so many to leave everything behind and journey alone to a mysterious country, a place without family or friends, where everything is nameless, and the future is unknown. This silent graphic novel is the story of every migrant, every refugee, every displaced person, and a tribute to all those who have made the journey. 'The Arrival' has become one of the most critically acclaimed books of recent years, a wordless masterpiece that describes a world beyond any familiar time or place.

In our Guided Reading (Book Talk) lessons, we will use two more award-winning texts, 'The Boy in the Girls' Bathroom' by Louis Sacher and 'The Boy who made everyone laugh' by Helen Rutter to further develop our comprehension skills such as predicting and summarising the plot, inferencing, comparing and contrasting different texts, analysing the author's use of language and the affects it has on the reader.

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At home, please encourage regular reading of fiction & non-fiction. Continue to promote the love for books and try to allow your child the opportunity to discuss the texts they've read. Through discussion at home, encourage them to develop their vocal expression in their written language, their understanding of the meaning of words and the effects they have. Remember - 'They have to be able to say it before they can write it.'

In <u>Science</u> our learning will focus on 'Evolution and Inheritance' then 'Scientists and Inventors' (Further information can be found on the curriculum plan).

At home, encourage their curiosity in the world around them so that they ask questions and seek to find the answers to everyday events.

Our <u>History</u> theme this half term is 'Ancient Greece'. We will study a range of key topics such as democracy, the Olympics, the Battle of Marathon, Greek Gods and Goddesses as well as the Trojan War. We will learn to place events in chronological order, study a range of primary and secondary sources and understand how our knowledge of the past is constructed from a range of sources.

Next half term in <u>Geography</u>, our theme is 'North and South America'. We will locate the world's countries, using maps to focus on Europe (highlighting the UK) and North and South America, concentrating on their environmental regions, key physical and human characteristics. We will examine geographical similarities and differences through the study of human and physical geography of a region of the United Kingdom and a location within North or South America. We will also extend our geographical terminology and map-reading skills.

<u>Physical Education (P.E.)</u> - under the established guidelines, <u>children must come to school in their P.E. kits</u> ready for lessons. Our P.E. day will take place on <u>Thursdays and Fridays</u>.

- The St. Paulinus P.E. kit consists of:
 - o a plain white t-shirt with or without the school logo (no brands or patterns),
 - o plain black or dark grey shorts / jogging bottoms or leggings (no brands or patterns),
 - o grey school hoodie with the school logo,
 - o Trainers or a pair of pumps.
- In addition, the <u>only</u> jewellery permitted in school is a pair of plain small stud earrings. If your child has pierced ears, these need to be removed on each morning of P.E. for health and safety reasons.

Please note that staff are not able to remove earrings, so this will result in your child not taking part in our P.E. lesson and an alternative task will be provided for the child, this is due to health and safety reasons.

- Long hair <u>must</u> be tied back.
- Please ensure your child wears their PE kit on their PE days. All P.E. kit and School uniform
 must be labelled clearly with your child's name. If it becomes lost, it can then be easily returned
 to the rightful owner.

<u>Homework</u> – Spellings will also be given out on **Mondays to learn for Friday's test. English** (reading comprehension and/or grammar & punctuation task) and **Maths** will be handed out the same day and <u>MUST</u> be completed and <u>returned by the Friday</u> of that same week. This gives the children enough time to see their class teacher if they are struggling plus we realise the importance of having family time at the weekend.

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The purpose of this work is to consolidate the learning from class and to prepare them for more intensive homework at high school. It is therefore extremely important that this work is completed. Any children who fail to bring/complete their homework will have to complete it during their playtime. If a child does not complete their homework three times in a half-term a letter will go home.

<u>Reading</u> - Children will have an independent reading book which will be brought home on a daily basis and MUST be returned to school every day. We will change your child's book once a week. Please remember to write in your child's reading record to acknowledge that you have listened to your child read. It is also very important to check your child understands when reading.

The Way Forward - Paperless Communication

As you know we try very hard to keep parents regularly informed about what's going on at our school, however sending paper letters home can be rather 'hit and miss' with letters often going astray along the way.

We aim to be 'Paperless', this is beneficial both to ourselves and to you because:

- Messages will get to you reliably.
- We can send messages directly to mums and dads at the same time.
- You will receive important or urgent messages more effectively.
- We can tell you more about what's going on within our school.
- Letters will also be available to read on the school's website and the School App

Spring Term Curriculum Overview

Mathematics - As mathematicians we will:

- add. convert. compare, subtract, multiply and divide fractions. Learn how to order and
- Understand the relationship between fractions, decimals and percentages.
- Recognise angles at points where they meet and find missing angles in shapes.
